Centre for Sustainable Development Law & Policy

Durham University's <u>Centre for Sustainable Development Law & Policy (CSDLP)</u> aims at building an inclusive and interdisciplinary hub for researchers, policymakers and businesses. We are engaged in policy-relevant research, outreach, and teaching initiatives. We are engaging wand working closely with a wide range of partners and policymakers locally and globally, to address the challenges of implementing the SDGs across different sectors in the 21st century.



- Our partnership with Durham County Council and the School Charity OASES helped develop content for the <u>ECO₂ Smart Schools Climate</u> <u>Conference</u>, convened ahead of COP26 in Glasgow. **4,000 pupils** from **130 schools** in **13 countries** participated in the ECO₂ Smart Schools Climate Conference.
- A similar school conference took place in 2022, co-organised with Durham County Council in the run up to COP27. On 14th October 2022, the CSDLP will co-convene a conference with Durham County Council and Durham University's Durham Energy Institute.
- The Centre for Sustainable Development Law & Policy at the Durham University Law School and the Global Policy Institute are delighted to offer a series of lectures: Global Environment Law in Dialogue with the Judiciary: Insights from Courts around the World.
- <u>JusTNOW (Just Transitions to a Net Zero World)</u> aims to develop a world-leading interdisciplinary work programme, to research sustainable and just solutions for accelerated decarbonisation of economies, and to achieve lasting societal well-being for the present and future generations. JusTNOW ties in experts from Durham University's Law School, the Department of Computer Science, the Department of Economics, and the Department of Biosciences.

N8 Research Partnership



The <u>N8 Research Partnership</u>, the strategic collaboration of the eight most research-intensive Universities in the North of England: Durham University, Lancaster, Leeds, Liverpool, Manchester, Newcastle, Sheffield, and York, is working to create the basis for supporting economic growth focused on the green economy. <u>N8 Net Zero North</u> will drive growth in the green economy in the North of England and beyond by coproducing research and innovation with businesses and other stakeholders to meet real-world challenges.

A <u>project to improve wind turbine technology</u> that involves researchers at Durham has been shortlisted for a global sustainability award. The Engineering and Physical Sciences Research Council (EPSRC) Prosperity Partnership project has been shortlisted in the External Partnerships category of the World Sustainability Awards 2023. The £7.7 million partnership between the universities of Durham, Sheffield, and Hull and energy companies Ørsted and Siemens Gamesa has developed ways to make wind turbine generators more efficient, reliable, lighter and cheaper.
