passages from the biblical text.

To consider, among other things, matters of history, literary analysis,

background and theology.

Content: Consolidation and extension of previous Biblical Hebrew language

learning with a focus on syntax.

Comprehension of Biblical Hebrew texts of intermediate difficulty (e.g.,

from Deuteronomy; Joshua; 1-2 Kings; Jonah).

Introduction to textual criticism, semantic analysis, and syntactic

analysis beyond the level of clauses.

Introduction to intermediate Biblical Hebrew reference grammars (e.g.,

B. T. Arnold and J. H. Choi; C.H.J. van der Merwe, J. A. Naudé and J.

H. Kroeze).

Discussion of exegetical and theological issues that the language of the

chosen texts raises.
