Aims: To strengthen students' ease and familiarity with reading New

Testament Greek through exposure to difficult texts, such that they gain the confidence to work with any part of the Greek New Testament.

To deepen students' exegetical skills in negotiating text-critical, semantic, syntactical, and literary issues, such that they are thoroughly equipped to take on Masters-level original language work, or to carry forward their language skills into regular use in a sustainable way within the demands of local-church ministry.

To deepen student's ability to sympathetically and critically engage with

biblical scholarship.

Content: Consolidation and extension of New Testament Greek language skills

(vocabulary, translation, syntax).

Translation and exegesis of more difficult New Testament Greek texts, including discussion and analysis of text-critical problems, syntax, and issues of genre (e.g. narrative, epistle, apocalyptic).

Consolidation and extension of knowledge of New Testament Greek syntax to advanced levels.

Analysis of current scholarship on the relevant texts.

Integrated and critical discussion of relevant theological and pastoral

issues arising from the text.
