This section contains important information for setting up your academic programme at Durham University. Please read through this section carefully before considering your modules and filling in your Learning Agreement.

C1: Choosing Modules

IMPORTANT NOTE FOR STUDENTS: PLEASE READ BEFORE COMPLETING YOUR LEARNING AGREEMENT

At Durham University, agreements are signed by individual university departments and are not universitywide agreements. This means that, in general, exchange students will have to choose modules (courses) within the Durham University department through which the agreement with their home university has been signed (students should check with the Exchange Coordinator in their university if they are not sure which department this is).

Modules offered by outside departments are subject to availability and can only be taken with prior consent from the relevant department. Certain restrictions may also apply to courses in some departments and students need to follow the advice below carefully before completing their Learning Agreements.

All undergraduate degrees at Durham University have a modular structure. Students normally study six modules each year, for three years (each module = 20 Durham credits / 10 ECTS credits).

All modules are taught in English, consist of lectures and seminars/workshops, and are assessed in the year in which they are taught. This takes the form of:

- Assignments (held during the academic year) and/or,
- Examinations (held in May/June). Students must be available during the examination period.

Individual assessment format and details for each module can be found in the relevant module outline (see the list of modules further below for details).

Students will be allocated to timetable compatible seminar groups by the Learning and Teaching team a couple of weeks after the start of teaching.

Students are asked to go through a module approval process prior to entering modules on their Learning Agreement. Incoming exchange students will have the opportunity to study any combination of modules from the undergraduate programmes offered by the Business School, subject to:

- a) Successfully meeting any prerequisite study requirements (and providing proof of the completed comparative prerequisite study within their own university).
- b) Timetable restrictions.

Exchange students should also have access to <u>MyTimetable</u> once registered on modules.

The university will allocate the selected modules to each student's Timetable. The online timetable https://timetable.dur.ac.uk/ will only show an overview of scheduled teaching activities via location or module whereas your personal timetable <u>https://mytimetable.durham.ac.uk/</u> will show you all the activities which you have been allocated to and should attend.

Co-requisites / Prerequisites

Co-requisite means you must take that module **together with** another. For exchange students this may not apply if you have passed one of the core requisites at your home university. For example, the core requisite for Advanced Financial Theory is Econometrics 1. If you have already studied Econometrics 1 at your home university then you will be able to study Advanced Financial Theory in Durham.

Pre-requisite means you must have completed the prerequisite module **before** studying the current module. For example, the prerequisite for Financial Risk Management is Derivative Markets. If you have already studied Derivative Markets at your home university then you will be able to study Financial Risk Management in Durham.

IMPORTANT! As previously mentioned, it is very important that for Level 2 and 3 modules that you successfully meet any prerequisite study requirements (and provide proof of the completed comparative prerequisite study within your own university). Any student who does not meet the prerequisites will not be given approval to register for the module.

To check the content of prerequisite modules listed below, and compare them against equivalent modules you have studied at your own university, you can visit the <u>Faculty Handbook</u>.

The above restrictions are to enable students to understand the material that they are studying.

Transcripts:

You will receive your official transcript in July/ August; in the interim, the Learning & Teaching Team can provide students with an unofficial statement of marks (subject to the release of provisional marks).

If you fail a module based on your examination result and decide to take a **re-sit**, you can resit any number of modules at Level 1 on one occasion only (in the August / September immediately after the first attempt). You can resit 60 credits at Level 2 (again in the August / September). After that you cannot resit at all. This is because we expect you to learn, during Levels 1 and 2, how to manage your time across a range of topics and to apply yourself to subject areas which you may not find particularly easy. These expectations are reflected in our <u>qualification descriptors</u>. If you pass a resit your mark is capped at 40% (a bare pass) so that you do not get any extra benefit from having had a 'second try'.

This may affect your enrolment in further studies, so please be aware of this when choosing to take part in a re-sit examination. **THERE WILL BE NO RELEASE OF MARKS/TRANSCRIPTS FOR RE-SITS PRIOR TO THE END OF NOVEMBER.**

Frequently Asked Questions

1. Where do I find information about specific modules?

Module outlines are available at <u>https://www.dur.ac.uk/faculty.handbook/</u> provide you with a very good overview of the delivery, contents, and assessments for each module. You will be able to access more detailed information (including instructors, detailed syllabus, lecture notes, reading lists etc.) upon arrival at Durham University and after registration at Durham University Business School. We regret we cannot send you these in advance as they may be subject to changes.

2. How many ECTS credits can I gain?

A full-time course load would be 120 UK credits (60 ECTS).

3. Which modules can I select?

Any module from the list contained in our Module Handbook (subject to you holding the relevant prerequisites/core requisites).

4. I have applied, but I have not received confirmation of my placement at DUBS yet

No need to worry, confirmation of a placement is sent by our central administration, and they typically deal with a very large number of applications.

5. The confirmation of my placement says I cannot take some modules I had selected

This may be due to several reasons (e.g., module is not running or not available to incoming students) and those will be stated on the confirmation letter. You can change your modules choice where required. The best time to do so is at the DUBS induction at the beginning of your placement (see next question on this).

6. How to Register?

You will register on our online platform. Once registered; you will see your lectures (large group teaching) and seminar (small group teaching) timetable, please ignore the listings of seminars as you will allocated your seminar groups once you arrive in Durham. Just check for any clashes in the lectures timetable only. If there are clashes in the lecture timetable you can change your modules.

7. Can I change modules?

Yes, we can do this however, this must be done by the deadline set. Please inform the International, Engagement and Careers office or email <u>business.international@durham.ac.uk</u> (your request will be forwarded for approval to the Exchange Coordinator).

8. What happens if I have a lecture clash?

You must delete one of your modules and choose another module which does not clash.

9. Can I take modules from different departments?

Students may choose modules from up to 3 departments. The majority of modules should be taken within the department with whom the European agreement is signed.

10. When will I receive my transcript?

You will receive your transcript once the Board of Examiners have met in June and have confirmed your marks, which will be usually around mid-August. We can however issue a statement of marks which will confirm any provisional marks issued.

11. How do I get my documents signed?

 Learning agreements – any amendments to your LA can be emailed to <u>business.international@durham.ac.uk</u> • Certification of Placement/Arrival & Departure dates – are signed by the central International Office based in the Palatine centre.

12. If I have a query who should I contact?

Before your placement

Please notice that we organise a comprehensive DUBS information session and individual students' consultations at the beginning of your placement (October). You are very welcome to ask all questions you may have and have not been answered by our online resources at those events. Unless your query is very urgent, all questions are best addressed at the induction session. You will be able to make amendments to your Learning Agreement and obtain all needed signatures at that stage.
