#### A: THE SCHOOL of EDUCATION

Durham has a long history of Education Studies and Teacher Education. The School of Education is a thriving and exciting centre of professional development and research for those involved in education from the early years to higher education. It has won a reputation both nationally and internationally for teaching and research in wide ranging areas of study.

As Professor Lynn Newton, Head of School, states:

"As one of the leading Schools of Education in the UK, our aim is to expand the frontiers of educational knowledge and to inspire our students to become the future architects of an equitable and sustainable world. Our students go on to successful careers in a wide range of different sectors. Our research and scholarship impacts regionally, nationally and internationally; from shaping education policy and practice, to developing educational research, research methodology and research capacity, to informing school improvements and contributing to the professional development of teachers around the world."

In the Year 2021, the School of Education was joint first nationally for research outputs (REF). According to The Times and Sunday Times Good University Guide 2023, the School was seventh in subject. Durham is in the top one hundred in the QS World University Rankings by Subject, 2022.

The School of Education offers degrees in Education Studies and Primary Education. Within the BA Education Studies, there is a BA Education Studies-Psychology, BA Education Studies-Geography and BA Education Studies-Sociology.

The School of Education has international Study Abroad partnerships with Uppsala University in Sweden and Charles University in Prague.

Academic staff have earned international reputations for their research.

### **B: DEGREE PROGRAMMES OFFERED and Modules**

The Education Studies degree programme is broad and multi-disciplinary in nature. The Primary Education degree programme, confers Qualified Teacher Status (QTS).

## **B1: Structure of the Degree**

Students on the Education Studies course follow a three-year programme. Those on Education Studies with a partner department subject spend half their time following modules in the School of Education and half in one of three other departments: Geography, Psychology or Sociology.

#### C: REQUIREMENTS AND RESTRICTIONS

#### C1: General

### **Choice of Modules - Read before completing the Learning Agreement:**

All Education modules at Durham University are taught and assessed in English.

At Durham University, Incoming European Exchange Programme agreements are signed by individual University departments and are not university-wide agreements. This means that, in general, students will have to choose modules (courses) within the Durham University school/department through which the Incoming European Exchange Programme agreement with their home university has been signed. Students should check with the Incoming European Exchange Programme Coordinator at their university if they are not sure which school/department this is. Modules offered by other departments are subject to availability and can only be taken with prior consent from the relevant department. Certain restrictions may also apply to courses in some departments and students should follow the guidelines below before completing the Learning Agreement.

**Modules** selected should be clearly written on the Learning Agreement for approval by the respective department(s).

**Please Note**: Before completing the Learning Agreement, it is essential to read the relevant departmental section(s) of this handbook carefully, to check which modules are

available to you and if any restrictions apply. It is imperative that an accurately completed Learning Agreement is submitted as part of the application process.

Only complete applications can be successfully processed.

'Section D: Module Details' provides a list of modules available for Incoming European Exchange Programme students in the receiving department where the agreement has been established, as well as a list of modules available for students entering through external departments. It is important to select from these modules only.

# **C2:** Departmental Requirements and Restrictions

When selecting modules, students should be aware that the School of Education cannot guarantee modules in other departments, even in 'partner departments' namely Sociology, Geography and Psychology. Some departments will only consider students who are studying at Durham for a full academic year (three terms).
